

How to nominate and spread the word

The **Victorian Aboriginal Honour Roll** recognises the achievements of First Nations Victorians, both past and present, who have profoundly contributed to their community and to Victoria.

Since 2011, **150 First Nations** Victorians have been inducted.

Nominations close at 11:59 PM 13 December 2024.

Eligibility

Nominees must identify as First Nations people, who:

- live in Victoria or lived in Victoria, if they have passed away
- have made a significant and lasting contribution to their communities or wider communities in Victoria or both.

You can nominate someone who has passed away, with permission from their next of kin.

Acknowledgement





We proudly acknowledge the Traditional Owners of Country across all lands and waters now known as the State of Victoria.

We pay respect to all First Peoples living in Victoria and those who have previously lived in Victoria. We pay respect to their families, communities, Elders and Ancestors.

What information do you need to nominate?

- Your name and contact email/phone number
- Permission from the nominee or their next of kin if the nominee has passed away
- Nominee's name and contact details or next of kin name and contact details
- Photograph of the nominee
- Responses to the nomination questions





The blues and greens of our country

"The range of green leaves represent the diversity of Traditional Owners throughout Victoria and the shield that floats inside them represents the resilience of our people over thousands of generations that we have been here.

The concentrated line work represents our unique symbolism that we use to explain our connection to country here in Victoria. The wavy blue lines represent the ocean and inland waterways that surround and run through Victoria. The subtle arcs that run through the water bodies represent the importance of water and our relationship and responsibility to it."
